The Jereboam Interview

We continue our series of extracts from the Jerusalem and Galilee Gazette, an imaginary first-century newspaper. Week by week the correspondent Jereboam interviews various people whose lives have been affected in some way by Jesus Christ and his teaching.

Rabbi Joseph

Jereboam: Today I am speaking with Rabbi Joseph, who will be well known to many of our readers in Caesarea Philippi. Rabbi Joseph, you've recently taken an interest in the teachings of Jesus, haven't you?

Rabbi: Yes. Many people had spoken to me about him enthusiastically. Finally last week I was able to attend one of his...well, "meetings" seems too grand a word for it...one of his sessions.

Jereboam: And your reaction? Rabbi: I was quite bowled over, to tell you the truth: such integrity, such humility - and such an engaging man. But really, you know, a lot of his teaching isn't that different from what the rest of us might say, if only we had the courage of our convictions. During the past week I've realised that lots of passages from the Scriptures relate very closely to Jesus' message, except that he doesn't water them down, as other people tend to do myself included. Take, for example, a couple of texts that I've read in the last few days: "The Lord is my light and my help" and "You keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on you". Now what Jesus would say, if I've grasped him correctly, is: "The Lord AND NOBODY ELSE is my light and my help" and "You keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on you ALL THE TIME." He just gives it to you straight.

Jereboam: I must say I'm surprised at his popularity, given the uncompromising nature of his message. Rabbi: I couldn't agree more, but look at them all, young and old, flocking to him. You know, I'm often told I need to make my teaching more relevant to modern life. Well, Jesus turns all that on its head: it's not a question of him making

himself relevant to modern life – he challenges you to make modern life relevant to his message.

Jereboam: So you'll continue your interest in his teaching?

Rabbi: Definitely: we can all

learn, even at my age.

Jereboam: I'm glad to hear that.

THIS WEEK

Keys are central to readings for the Twenty-First Sunday of Ordinary Time. The first reading from Isaiah offers the story of the faithful servant Eliakim, who will be given the keys for his master's palace. Paul's brief reading from the Letter to the Romans is a moving prayer filled with awe at the depth and unknowing ways of our Lord. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus asks his followers what people are saying about him. Then he asks the real question, "Who do you say I am?" Peter's direct answer, "You are the Christ" prompts Jesus' reply that Peter would be given the keys to the kingdom of heaven and would be the rock upon which his church would be built.

This week we have the Memorial of St. Augustine and the Memorial of the Passion of John the Baptist.

The first readings this week are from Paul's First Letter to the Thessalonians, the oldest book in the New Testament. The letters are affectionate and frank reminders of the humiliation and challenges that Paul met in preaching to this community he loved so much. These readings are a reminder that the letters of Paul were just that - letters to teach, encourage and support early communities of Christians.

Matthew's Gospel this week includes stories of Jesus strongly challenging the Pharisees. He saw how they made people's lives so difficult by their insistence on the rules and appearances while neglecting mercy and good faith. He chides them for paying attention to the extraneous and not the message: "Blind

guides, who strain out the gnat and swallow the camel!" His criticism grows stronger: "On the outside you appear righteous, but inside you are filled with hypocrisy and evildoing." Jesus teaches about preparation: Stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come." In the parable of the ten maidens who go out to meet the bridegroom, many of the women did not prepare for the meeting and do not have enough oil for their lamps and Jesus says again, "Stay awake." Saturday's gospel is the dramatic story of the three servants who are given resources by their master and rewarded or punished for what they did with the resources they had.

Next Sunday we see a glimpse of the Prophet Jeremiah who understands the pain of following the Lord and decides not to speak the Lord's name again, "but then it becomes like fire burning in my heart." St Paul's letter to he Romans encourages those ancient Romans - and us - not to conform to this age but to discern the will of God. In St Matthew's Gospel, Jesus corrects his disciples' resistance to his own passion and death, telling them that if they try to save their lives, they'll lose them. "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me."

A homily for Trinity 12

+ In today's Gospel Jesus asks his disciples: 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?'

And it's an important question, perhaps the most important of all. Jesus doesn't ask it in a casual way just throwing out a request for gossip, but - because who he is is so central to his mission, he wants to know what people are saying about him. And his disciples respond by saying, 'Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' - that is, someone in a long line of those who had witnessed to the reality of God and have proclaimed it to the people of Israel, and who in popular religious feeling of the time were somehow expected to return and herald the liberation of the people of God at the end of the world.

But Jesus doesn't leave it at that: he says to his disciples - and I suppose

this means those closest to him, the Apostles: 'But who do you say that I am?' That is, it's all very well to repeat what other people are saying about me, but you - who are closest to me, who know me best - who do you say that I am?

And Peter's response is very clear: 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.'

Peter recognises that Jesus isn't simply one of the long line of prophets, but is the Christ - literally 'the anointed one' who stands in a completely unique relationship with the Father - essentially the confession of faith which we ourselves will repeat (in a more developed form put together by the Church Fathers) when we stand and say the Nicene Creed in a few minutes' time.

Peter's declaration of faith has the

ringing quality of truth - as Jesus himself says of an insight, not just acquired naturally by living in close proximity with him, but by a divine revelation which brings human understanding, a knowledge of the Jewish Scriptures and sheer gut instinct together. It stands with that other statement of belief made by Peter's fellow Apostle, Thomas in St John's Gospel when he is finally confronted with the reality of Christ's resurrection: "My Lord and my God." And the *timing* of Peter's statement here is also important, because it happens just before the Transfiguration, when he and the other apostles, James and John, see Christ in his glory as an anticipation of the Resurrection and seen in the company of Moses and Elijah. In other words Christ is not only the latest in the line of God's messengers - or the reincarnation of one of them but is himself the fulfilment of everything that had been promised by God from the beginning. And, allied with the Transfiguration, is Jesus' prediction of the necessity of his own death in order to fulfil his divine mission. And he follows it up with the his call for all his followers to unite themselves to him in his death and resurrection: to die to ourselves in order to live for him and with him. So – let's go back to the beginning that question of Jesus: 'But who do

you say that I am?' has an importance far beyond its immediate context - in other words it's addressed to us as well as to his first disciples - it's <u>the</u> existential question which is addressed to every individual in every generation: 'Who do you say that I am.'

Every age - every historical era perhaps even every generation - has had its own view of what we might call the "who, what and why" of God. Human culture changes, evolves, uses the kinds of imagery and story-telling which is relevant to its needs and its situation. That's inevitable, of course - the message is one which we need to be able to understand, even if the reality remains the same. But that's not an invitation to have our own subjective or esoteric opinion of who Jesus might be. It's quite clear from the Lord's reply to Peter's response, 'You are the Christ, the son of the living God' that not every opinion of him is equally valid: 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven.'

But what this is, is_an invitation to reflect upon our own relationship with Christ. Who do we think he is?. How do we encounter him in our lives? Who is Jesus for us? It's an invitation to reflect on a tradition of faith which says quite clearly that he is God's own answer to the deepest questions and longings of the human heart. It's an invitation through prayer and service to explore and deepen that relationship

'Who do you say that I am' is a crucial question for each one of us. And we can only answer it both by what we say and - *crucially* - what we do – by the way we live our lives. +
