The Collect

Lord of all life and power, who through the mighty resurrection of your Son overcame the old order of sin and death to make all things new in him: grant that we, being dead to sin and alive to you in Jesus Christ, may reign with him in glory; to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be praise and honour, glory and might, now and in all eternity. **AMEN**

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Peter began to speak to those assembled in the house of Cornelius: 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that

John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power: how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

The Jereboam Interview

We continue our series of extracts from the Jerusalem and Galilee Gazette, an imaginary first-century newspaper. Week by week, the correspondent Jereboam interviews people whose lives have been affected in some way by Jesus Christ and his teaching.

Gardener, Sharon and Esther

Gardener: 'Morning.

Jereboam: Lovely day, isn't it?

Jereboam: Oh, yes. I tell you what: we could do with some good weather, after all the terrible goings-on of the last few days. What with...Look, would you excuse me, I've just seen that woman over there. She's a friend of mine, and she looks rather upset. I

ought to go and check she's all right. **Gardener:** Of course; you do what you need to do. It was good to meet you.

Jereboam: Sharon, are you all right? I imagine you're still upset about Jesus.

Sharon: It's even worse than we thought. Jereboam, someone's stolen his body.

Jereboam: They've what?
Sharon: Exactly what I say. I went to the tomb where they laid his body on the eve of the Sabbath.
Someone has rolled away the boulder that was covering the entrance, they've unwrapped his body and removed it. After all we've been through! You wouldn't imagine that people could stoop so low.

Jereboam: I must say, that's really awful. I feel quite shaken myself, and I wasn't even one of his followers. People like you must be...

Sharon! Sharon! Sharon!
Sharon: Oh, Esther, have you heard about Jesus? His body's been... Esther: No. he's alive!

Sharon: What?

Esther: Mary's just seen him. She started off thinking he was the gardener, but it was Jesus. He's alive!

Sharon: But he's dead – I was there when they took his body down from the cross. Mary's making a mistake: she's just too upset to think straight.

Esther: She's not upset; she's ...she's radiant. There's no question about it: he's alive.

Jereboam: Excuse me, but did you say that Mary had thought Jesus was the gardener?

Esther: Yes. They were talking for quite a while about this and that. At first she just didn't recognise him, didn't realise what had happened. Mind you, it's understandable. Things like that don't exactly happen every day, do they?

Jereboam: No, I suppose not. As a matter of fact I rather think I've just seen him myself, except I didn't notice who he was either. I can't believe I

was so stupid: he was with me and I didn't realise it! Come on; let's see if we can find him. He was over here...

THIS WEEK

On Easter Sunday, we hear from the Acts of the Apostles Peter's preaching about the Resurrection. The letter to the Colossians reminds us "You have died and your lives are hidden with Christ in God." The gospel is from St John and gives us the first story of that Easter morning - Mary Magdalene discovers the empty tomb and runs to Peter and the "disciple Jesus loved" to tell them. They run to the tomb and discover for themselves that it is empty.

The weekday first reading for Easter Week is from the Acts of the Apostles. We hear Peter's preaching the Good News and experience the first deeds of the Apostles, which parallel the acts of Jesus, including the conflicts he experienced and his power to heal.

The gospels this week are all resurrection appearances. These wonderful stories contain some common elements. They appear designed to make it clear that this was not a group of disciples who dreamed up the resurrection, because they were hoping for it so much. In fact, they found it difficult to believe. The Jesus they saw and experienced was not a "ghost." Instead, he had a body.

Monday, is the story of Jesus appearing to Mary Magdalene and the other Mary, as well as the "cover-up story" and pay off of the guards. Tuesday, we read of Jesus' appearance to Mary Magdalene, through the eyes of St John's Gospel. Jesus missions her to announce the Good News to his brothers. On Wednesday we are treated to St Luke's story of Jesus' appearance to the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. They were sad, because they had hoped the story would have turned out differently. Jesus tells them why he had to first suffer and die in order to enter into his glory. As they stopped to eat, "he was made known to them in the breaking of the bread." Thursday Jesus appears in the room where the disciples are gathered. "Peace be with you" he says and then eats with them and shows them his wounds. On Friday, we have the Risen Lord's appearance in St John's Gospel at the Sea of Tiberias. Peter decided to

return to fishing. Jesus appears and remissions him. On Saturday, the week concludes with the summary of appearances in what appears to be an addition to the end of St Mark's Gospel. Next Sunday, the Second Sunday of Easter, we are given a picture of how the early community gathered around as "Many signs and wonders were done among the people at the hands of the apostles." St John's Gospel gives us two post-resurrection stories that feature St Thomas, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed "

A Homily for Easter Sunday

+ We've emerged from Holy Week, and the strange, unreal quiet of last Saturday, through the fire and light of last night's Vigil ceremonies into the joy of Easter morning.

But why is Easter so hard to talk about? The events of last week – Holy Week - speak to a profound experience of anxiety, fear and dereliction; it addresses the complexities of human relationships, all the loyalties and betrayals of personal and public life along with the expediency and amorality of those who wield power. The story is so gripping because it speaks to us about the things we know, or can see, in the world around us.

I've always found it's so much easier to speak about Holy Week than it is about Easter – although of course we find the meaning of Resurrection precisely in those events of Holy Week.

Why is the Resurrection itself so hard to talk about? Today's Gospel as St John tells it was a frantic matter of shock, running feet and the discovery of a empty tomb – there was no one there. There were no eyewitnesses to Christ's rising, and no attempt to describe something not seen.

How do you put into words a mystery that is beyond words? The resurrection is poetry, metaphor – fable made reality. It is very much reality. But how do we engage with it? It's an indefinable *experience*, true and valid, but one which like water, escapes and flows through our cupped hands when we try to hold on to it. Like the Risen Christ himself in the Gospels, it vanishes as soon as we realise we've encountered it. To base the proclamation

of an entire faith around this elusive Resurrection feels like madness, yet that's exactly what we are called to do..... and we find redemption and new life there. And what we discover isn't the wiping away of pain, grief, and death as if they had never been, but all those all too real things transcended and transformed. That's where our hope springs from. The Resurrection, like the Risen Lord himself, comes to us on silent feet. It creeps up on us unexpectedly, it enters the locked rooms of our hearts and minds. and when we turn to face it - it's wild, untameable; it darts away and hides And yet somehow we know its reality, and we see its meaning barely concealed at the heart of all things. And when we find it, we know we've come to a place that is home, the kingdom prepared for us from the foundation of the world...

"The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes"

This is poet Rainer Maria Rilke, here in a translation by Robert Bly

My eyes already touch the sunny hill. going far beyond the road I have begun, So we are grasped by what we cannot grasp; it has an inner light, even from a distance-and changes us, even if we do not reach it, into something else, which, hardly sensing it, we already are; a gesture waves us on answering our own wave... but what we feel is the wind in our faces.

THE RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS AT EASTERTIDE

(This replaces the Nicene Creed on Easter Sunday)

Dear friends, through the Pascal mystery we have been buried with Christ in baptism so that we may rise with him to new life. Now that we have completed our Lenten observance, let us renew the promises we made in baptism when we rejected Satan and his works, and promise to serve God faithfully in His Holy Catholic Church.

And so I ask you:-

Do you reject Satan? I do

And all his works? I do

And all his empty promises? I do

Do you believe in God the Father Almighty, creator of heaven and earth? **I do**

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son our Lord, who was born of the Virgin Mary, was crucified, died and was buried, rose from the dead and is now seated at the right hand of the Father? **I do**

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, the Communion of Saints, the forgiveness of sins the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting? **I do** God, the all powerful Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, has given us a new birth by water and the Holy Spirit and forgiven all our sins. May he also keep us faithful to our Lord Jesus Christ, for ever and ever. **AMEN**

[The priest may then sprinkle those present with blessed water as a reminder of the water of baptism.]
